THE ARMADA OF LUXURY CATAMARANS LAUNCHING ONTO THE MARKET ARE PROVING TO BE A GAME-CHANGER FOR THOSE WHO LIKE TO CRUISE IN COMFORT. LIKE A TOP HOTEL SUITE, WRITES **RENÉE BRACK**, BUT EVEN BETTER, WITH THE ADDED FREEDOM TO ROAM WHEREVER YOU MAY CHOOSE..

Air-conditioning, plush bedding, absolute waterfront views everyday, spacious entertaining areas, superbly-appointed interiors and a mobile tender ready to launch so you can explore local attractions these cruisers offer more than a top hotel suite.

Cruising is a rewarding alternative to caravanning with the added freedom of forging your own path through the water instead of being confined to roads and the close quarters of other vehicles.

"Paradise is out there but you need a boat for the best bits," says Brent Vaughan, director of Multihull Central. "The exciting thing about cruising is that it's one of the last great adventures. There is no NRMA safety net. This brings an incredible sense of achievement when you discover skills you didn't know you had, find the character to overcome challenges and feel the sense of discovery as you pull into somewhere remote and untouched.

"Rather than being bound by the limits of land and one continent, you have no limits on where you travel on water. From Europe, to the Americas, South Pacific, Australia and New

Zealand, Asia and more are all very achievable on the right boat."

The right boat at Multihull Central is the Outremer 5X, a European Boat Of The Year winner.

"Consider a luxury five-star overwater bungalow in Tahiti, but much bigger and with your personal items around so you're not living out of a suitcase," says Vaughan. "You wake in the morning, enjoy a real coffee from your coffee machine then some breakfast on the back deck overlooking turquoise waters, feed the fish before slipping in for a swim then take your tender to the local secret dive spot. Once the novelty wears thin, you pull up anchor and in a few days could be in a completely different country, like the Cook Islands, Tonga or Fiji. And if you choose, you never have to go near a busy, noisy and tacky

because your beverage-of-choice is less likely to spill or land on the deck when a wave hits. Increased stability also reduces seasickness.

In terms of operation, they are easier to sail than a single hull and they come with an ever-changing, uninterrupted view in any given moment. You can sightsee from the flybridge without leaving the comfort of your floating suite.

Luxury cruising can also bring people closer together especially in the case where one person enjoys traditional sailing and the other is less enthusiastic. These cats excel in terms of bluewater performance and can get up to double digit speeds that would please the cruiser who's fond of racing. But it's life on board that has elevated the experience to something sublime.

John Pruim owns Triple Zero, a 42-

foot hybrid Lagoon 420 built by the French Beneteau Group and available through The Multihull Group (TMG), part of the Windcraft Group / Yoti brokerage network. Luxury was the first and most important consideration for Prium when choosing a cruiser.

"My wife is not really a sailor," says Prium. "She came along reluctantly at first. Now, for the past 16 years, we have sailed six months of every year. Our house in Buderim has everything she wants and enjoys so to get her to join me on the water, I needed a boat that offered the same level of comfort and style. The choice had to be a catamaran. Now she has everything she loves at home in a luxury boat as well."

John Cowpe is the managing director of TMG and says a normal approach people make in becoming a luxury cat owner is to work with the commissioning team at Lagoon on the build with an option to personally collect your new acquisition.

"You can pick the vessel up in France and enjoy the Mediterranean for a season or two before most commonly joining the Atlantic Rally for Cruisers (ARC) in a cruise in company from the Canaries to the Caribbean – arriving in time for Christmas celebrations and a glass of Jamaican rum," says Cowpe. "A few months of exploring and come April, you find yourself transiting the Panama canal and popping out into the Pacific where another sea of adventure awaits and your cruise back to Australia continues.'


Eric and Janine Cook own a TAG 60 called Stardust, located in Mooloolaba and appreciate the personalisation of life aboard their catamaran.

"We find that having a complete set of luxury amenities at our disposal is awe-inspiring – a fivestar kitchen, a beautiful saloon with audio-visual entertainment, private cabins, laundry facilities, ice-maker, microwave, oven and a dishwasher available for our sole personal use makes for the best home-away-fromhome lifestyle imaginable. Then with all this luxury, the ability to sail to any destination with a minimum of noise and fuel consumption, is a tremendous privilege.

The TAG 60 is a South African-built catamaran that is available through Multihull Solutions and features leather furnishings along with a dining table of adjustable height. It also has safety sensors to de-power the vessel and prevent capsizing.

Grant Horsfield, owner of Arabella, a Fountaine Pajot Victoria 67, says stability, space and flexibility were his essential luxuries.

"It is virtually impossible to equate the luxury and experience of the environment on a catamaran with any hotel," explain Eric and Jane Cook, owners of *Stardust*.

"Here, you have all the amenities for your sole use. In even the best hotels, you share everything with other guests and the premises are hardly mobile. The privacy and accompanying views on a catamaran far excel the top hotels in the best locations. On a cat, when you get bored with or tired of one place, you just move on and take all your luxury with you."

and to move the catamaran from one bay to the next. Most motors are annoying. We refer to motor boats as 'stinkers' because of the fumes. We like tranquility so the less noise, the better. The propeller regenerates a lot of power so in theory, we could sail around the world without even running the motor—as long as there is wind with the back up of a generator.

"Luxury is not having to put up with the stink, vibration and noise of an engine," he adds.

Another of the exquisitely designed catamarans with every human comfort in mind is the range of Leopard vessels from the 40 to the flagship 58 available through David Flynn of Leopard Catamarans in Queensland.

This award-winner is constructed by South African boatbuilders Robertson & Caine with contributions to its unique, modern design by naval architects Simonis and Voogd. The flybridge has seating for up to 10 people and the outdoor kitchen and grill is better than having a barbeque at home.

Reluctantly, Pruim is selling his Lagoon 420 *Triple Zero* via Yoti but sees it as upgrading in a sense.

"My son also bought a Lagoon catamaran so I'm sharing it with him. He sails two to three weeks a year so we can have it the rest of the time. I'm 74 years old and I want to have another 10 years on the water."
